From the Chair

Dear Fellow Alumni,

Spring is here but, for many of us, it will be harder to enjoy with the constant reminders of the dreadful plight of the Ukrainians.

Our Twelfth Lecture on the **British Constitution – Strengths, Weaknesses and Risks** was held on 21st April. Over 100 people attended, well below the average for pre-Covid lectures. Perhaps this reflected continuing nervousness about Covid. Perhaps also some have got out of the habit of attending live lectures. Whatever the reason, Professor Mike Kenny's lecture was excellent. His arguments were balanced but penetrating, the style entertaining and the handling of audience questions superb. There has been much positive feedback.

The subjects for our next two lectures could hardly be more timely. The thirteenth will be held from **6.30pm on Tuesday 14**th **June** and will be delivered by **Dr Matthew D'Auria** of the University of East Anglia. His subject will be **'What is a Nation?'** Dr D'Auria is a leading historian of ideas and will consider the tools forged by historians and social scientists to grasp the true nature of nationhood and nationalism, its power to capture hearts and minds and its influence on world stability. This will pave the way for our fourteenth public lecture on **Friday 30**th **September**, when **Dr Bridget Kendall**, Master of Peterhouse and past Senior Foreign Correspondent at the BBC, will talk on **'Understanding Russia Today'**. Dr Kendall has twice publicly interviewed Vladimir Putin in the Kremlin. This will be an exceptional opportunity to hear the views of a leading expert on Russia.

On **26**th **January 2023** we change tack when our fifteenth lecturer will be **Sir Paul Nurse**, Chief Executive and Director of the Francis Crick Institute and a former President of the Royal Society. He is one of the most distinguished scientists in the world, having been awarded the 2001 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine for discoveries of protein molecules that control the division of cells in the cell cycle. His subject will be **'What is Life?'** (This also happens also to be the title of a famous and charming book by Erwin Schrödinger, published in 1944, which represented the first foray by a physicist into this most complex of biological questions.) Excitingly for us, Sir Paul has strong Norfolk connections; he was born in Norwich and earned his PhD degree from the University of East Anglia.

I hope many of you will decide to attend with family and friends. Our lectures are designed as you know to celebrate the rigorous pursuit and dissemination of truth by leading academics.

2021/22 Norfolk Cambridge Society Student Award Essay Competition

This year, as in the previous two academic years, the Norfolk Cambridge Society has run a Student Award Scheme with the aim of encouraging students who attend Norfolk schools to consider applying to the University of Cambridge.

Final year students who had applied for and been offered either a firm or a conditional place at a Cambridge College were invited via their schools to submit a *circa* 1000-word essay on a topic chosen by the NCS Awards Committee members.

Entrants' essays are anonymised and then 'scored' by the Awards Committee members before a short-list for a final interview is drawn up. Up to three £500 Cash prizes are normally available, while runner-up prizes may be awarded at the discretion of the Committee.

There can be few readers who are unaware of the Covid-related difficulties and disruptions experienced by all schools and their pupils during the 21/22 academic year. We are therefore particularly grateful both to the staff in local schools who promoted our award scheme and to those students who submitted essays and thus made it possible for us to run the scheme for a third year.

The overall quality of submissions in all three years has been high, and this year, perhaps particularly so. I and my colleagues would like to congratulate our three 2022 prize winners and the very worthy runner up. All four have been invited to attend the NCS lecture at Norwich School on **Friday September 30th** 2022 when we will be able to congratulate them in person.

Encouraged by positive feedback from students and their schools, the Awards Committee will, over the coming months, review and evaluate the outcomes of our three 'pilot' years. In particular, we will examine ways of expanding and developing the scheme to open up the competition to more students. One of the 2020 winners said of her participation in the Scheme:

'The Student Awards provided a thought-provoking opportunity to consider and put into words what I would like to achieve from my university degree, whilst also giving the chance to discuss the issues I highlighted with members of the Society who are experienced in a variety of different fields. I would certainly recommend entering this competition for anyone hoping to go to Cambridge.'

The Awards Scheme prizes are funded by the Society's lecture series. With this in mind, I encourage all readers of this newsletter to support the NCS lecture series and the awards scheme by attending the NCS lectures and promoting both the lectures and the awards to local schools and their students.



The Industry of Norwich: A talk and guided walk with Dr Mary Fewster discovering Norwich's industrial past. Friday 1st July - meeting 2pm at The King's Centre, Norwich. NR1 1PH

Alumni and guests are invited to join the NCS for a talk and walk looking at evidence of Norwich's hidden industrial past. The walk will be led by Dr Mary Fewster, who has taught at the School for Continuing Education at UEA and is a member of the Norfolk Historic Buildings Group. Last year, Mary conducted a walk on the north side of the river: this year we are looking at the south side. First, we'll meet at the King's Centre and Mary will give an illustrated talk about the many factories along King Street. Tea may be purchased at the Centre. Then we set off on the walk (which will include quite a steep incline) looking for some of the industrial remains. The walk last year filled very quickly and was repeated by popular demand. It's amazing how every day we walk past but don't recognise the signs of Norwich's industrial past. You should allow about 2 hours in total.

186 Gwydir Street, Cambridge: A terraced house with a secret. Thursday, July 28th at 1.30pm

As students, many of us biked down Mill Road. Then the terraced houses provided student accommodation but now one such house in Gwydir Street has received Grade II* listed status.

David Parr was a working-class Victorian decorative artist who worked for the Cambridge firm of F. R. Leach & Sons painting houses, colleges and churches with designs created by some of the best architects and designers in the country, including George Frederick Bodley, William Morris and Charles Eamer Kempe. In the evening, Parr decorated his own two bedroomed terraced house in Gwydir Street. After his death in 1927, his granddaughter, aged 12, came to live in the house to look after her grandmother and she stayed for the next 85 years. She changed little, preserving the artwork, wall tiles, Lino and furniture.

In 2009, the house was discovered by Tamsin Wimhurst, who was studying for a Master's degree in Local History, and so began the enormous task of purchasing and preserving the property.

Because of its size, only 6 people may visit in a group and only 48 people per week. We have managed to book a visit for 6 people the **cost of which is £16 each**, including a donation. The tour will last approximately one and a half hours.

Constructed in a WW2 bomb crater during the Covid Lockdowns, Thorington Outdoor Theatre held its inaugural season in 2021. This magical setting can accommodate 350 spectators and it is even possible to bring your (well behaved) dog!

You can expect some wonderful and well-known music by Handel, Mozart, the great bel canto Italian opera composers and Rodgers & Hammerstein all performed by four stunning young singers and five of the finest chamber musicians in the country. There will be some surprises and unusual gems from the emotional depth of the quartet from Beethoven's Fidelio to the caustic wit of Sondheim's lyrics and sheer pazzazz of the final number from Verdi's Falstaff. The orchestral scores have been expertly arranged for string quintet and the concert will last 1 hour 45 minutes including a twenty-minute interval. Drinks may be purchased and homemade nibbles will be available although you may choose to arrive early with your own picnic. There is onsite parking and just a short walk through the trees brings you to the theatre. **Tickets are £25** and include the interval nibbles!
