NCS Public Lectures

For our eighteenth lecture on **Thursday 28th September**, our distinguished speaker will be Roger Mosey, Master of Selwyn College Cambridge and former Editorial Director at the BBC. His topic will be '**Delivering Truth in a Tribal World'**. Throughout its history the BBC has been one of the most trusted news organisations in the world. In recent years, however, modern technology, sometimes fuelled by artificial intelligence, has greatly facilitated the creation and dissemination of disinformation, fuelling discord. Even the BBC has sometimes struggled to represent the whole of the United Kingdom in a time of fragmentation and uncertainty. Roger Mosey will examine these and many other influences challenging professional journalism today and discuss how the BBC and other reputable news organisations across the world seek to ensure their survival in a rapidly-changing world.

Arguably, no-one is better qualified to speak on this most important subject. Roger spent most of his career at the BBC, holding positions at various times as Head of BBC Television News, Editor of the Today programme, Controller of BBC Radio 5 Live, Director of Sport and the BBC Director of the London 2012 Olympics.

Please note that this is now sold out.

The first lecture of 2024 will be delivered on **Thursday 29**th **February** by Tom Little KC who will speak on the criminal justice system.
