#### **NCS Public Lectures**

#### **Nineteenth NCS Lecture**

Our nineteenth public lecture was held on Thursday 29<sup>th</sup> February at Norwich School on the topic 'Criminal Justice in England – How Good is the System?' It was delivered by the leading prosecuting barrister in the country, Tom Little KC, First Senior Treasury Counsel, who held the packed audience riveted throughout. The grim picture he painted was of a fundamentally sound system close to breaking point under the pressure of chronic underfunding by successive governments. The policing system is seriously undermanned, there are too few criminal barristers because they are too poorly paid, the courts have huge backlogs and the prisons are full to bursting. Britain has a far higher incarceration rate than most other Northern European countries and a significantly higher rate of recidivism. In spite of this, the impression was given that we have not in the past invested much in learning from other countries, regarding them as too culturally different. It was both fascinating and alarming to hear such open concern emanating from such a very distinguished figure operating at the top of his profession. Nearly three hundred people attended and the questions after the lecture flowed thick and fast.

#### **Twentieth NCS Public Lecture**



Our twentieth lecture will be held on **Monday 10<sup>th</sup> June from 6.30pm** and will be delivered by Simon McDonald, Lord McDonald of Salford, former Permanent Secretary at the Foreign & Commonwealth Office and former Head of the Diplomatic Service. He is now Master of Christ's College, Cambridge. His topic will be 'Lessons from a Life in Diplomacy'. Lord McDonald's lecture will contain a wide-ranging analysis of the challenges of effective diplomacy in the modern world and what it takes to operate and lead at the highest levels of government. He will discuss the use of hard and soft power and the role that Britain can still play in making the world a safer place. Finally, he will set out his thoughts on the changes that need to take place in the structure of government in order to deliver a more effective service for the British people. This will be a wonderful opportunity to hear first-hand from a recently retired top civil servant how Britain manages its relationships with the rest of the world and how the governance of our country could be improved.

The lecture is already sold out in the Blake Studio with two months to go. It is therefore possible that we shall again reach full capacity in the Refectory and have to turn people away. #### East of England Royal Geographical Society Events

Our Norwich events are held at the Blake Studio, Norwich School with parking just outside. Glass of wine available from 7.00 pm for a 7.30 start. We seek to make our events topical within the wide brief that Geography now offers.

Our next event is **Thursday 4th April** when Professor Andrew Clarke, with a long career in the British Antarctic Survey, will introduce us to the wildlife of the Antarctic continent as well as impacts and future prospects in the light of climate change. The melting Arctic is very much in the news, and Andrew will explain what is happening at the other pole - different but still alarming.

Looking further ahead we have:

**Tuesday 7th May:** Professor John Shears on *Shackleton' Ship Beneath the Ice* after the discovery in March 2022 of his ship The Endurance. This lecture is at the earlier time of 5.00pm and is primarily aimed at a school audience, but all ages are welcome. RGS in London currently have an exhibition of the most extraordinary photos taken from Shackleton's expeditions – open till October and well worth a visit.

**Thursday 16th May:** Sir John Sawers with Nicholas Crane discussing Geopolitics, Conflict and the United Nations. This will take an overview of topical conflicts and their implications for the UN and the Security Council. Sir John had an ambassadorial career in the Middle East and Africa, culminating in UK Ambassador to the UN, Foreign Affairs adviser to a succession of British Prime Ministers and finally heading MI6. The discussion will be led by Nick Crane, who grew up in Norfolk, is a former President of RGS, a well well-known broadcaster.

**Thursday 6th June: Fraser Bradbury** leading a guided walk on the Westacre Estate (PE32 1UA), exploring the grounds and explaining the Estate's efforts in biodiversity management and rewilding.

#### **Exhibition of Ukrainian War Photographs**

An exhibition of Ukrainian war photographs will be held in central Norwich from early May. They have been provided by Major Oleksandr Bielov, the officer in charge of most of the Ukrainian Army's media communications. He has just turned sixty and is planning to retire to Norfolk later this year to be with his family, who are already living here. The photographs were taken by a Ukrainian sergeant attached to his unit, who was formerly a professional photographer. They are extraordinarily powerful and moving.

The theme of the exhibition will be *Pain & Struggle* and its objectives will be to give British people a deeper understanding of the realities of modern warfare and its impact on Ukraine. The photographs depict modern weaponry in action, the conditions in which soldiers and civilians are having to live, the devastation of buildings and infrastructure, the emotional impact on the people and many tender moments amongst the horrors.

It is hoped that the exhibition will help those attending to reflect on the importance of defending democracy, the adequacy of international support that Ukraine is receiving and the possible impact of war on our own country if the conflict in Ukraine is allowed to spread. This is a subject dear to our hearts as we have until recently hosted a Ukrainian refugee family.

A very generous Norfolk businessman is providing a large amount of temporarily empty office space, in central Norwich, to enable us to house the exhibition. Other individuals have begun pledging funds to help us meet the costs of printing and mounting the photographs. More donations are still needed. We are also in urgent need of volunteer gallery attendants. The exhibition space will be available from 1am to 4pm Monday to Friday but it is the availability of volunteer attendants to keep an eye on the photographs that will determine when the gallery is open. All volunteers will need to do is arrive on time and stay for either three hours or six. They can bring family members and friends with them to keep them company and share the load. Desks will be provided and there will be plenty of time to work on other things while you are there.

Please email <u>exhibition.norwich@gmail.com</u> if you would like to help, indicating how much time you are able to offer. If you cannot be a volunteer, we hope you will come and visit the exhibition anyway. Entry will be free. Opening hours will be shown on the NCS website nearer the time.
